**2.40 (b) (3) DIRECT
ATTENDING VETERINARIAN AND ADEQUATE VETERINARY CARE (DEALERS AND EXHIBITORS).**

Sec. 2.40 Attending veterinarian and adequate veterinary care (dealers and exhibitors) . (b) Each dealer or exhibitor shall establish and maintain programs of adequate veterinary care that include: (3) Daily observation of all animals to assess their health and well-being; Provided, however, That daily observation of animals may be accomplished by someone other than the attending veterinarian; and Provided, further, That a mechanism of direct and frequent communication is required so that timely and accurate information on problems of animal health, behavior, and well-being is conveyed to the attending veterinarian;

1. On grandpa's place, a bulldog's right eye was red and inflamed. Also, the right side of the animals face was a red inflamed wound. The animal could be in pain and is in need of seeing the vet.
2. A mother dog in the whelping building has an inflamed red wound on its right shoulder. This animal could be in pain and is in need of seeing the vet.
3. A boxer was having runny stool and appeared dehydrated during the inspection. the animal could be in pain and is in need of seeing the vet.
4. A weimereir pup was not moving much and appear dehydrated during the inspection. The pup is in need of seeing the vet.

**3.1 (c) (3)
HOUSING FACILITIES, GENERAL.**

Sec. 3.1 Housing facilities, general. (c) Surfaces-- (3) Cleaning. Hard surfaces with which the dogs or cats come in contact must be spot-cleaned daily and sanitized in accordance with Sec. 3.11(b) of this subpart to prevent accumulation of excreta and reduce disease hazards. Floors made of dirt, absorbent bedding, sand, gravel, grass, or other similar material must be raked or spot-cleaned with sufficient frequency to ensure all animals the freedom to avoid contact with excreta. Contaminated material must be replaced whenever this raking and spot-cleaning is not sufficient to prevent or eliminate odors, insects, pests, or vermin infestation. All other surfaces of housing facilities must be cleaned and sanitized when necessary to satisfy generally accepted husbandry standards and practices. Sanitization may be done using any of the methods provided in Sec. 3.11(b) (3) for primary enclosures.

1. The several metal doors have brown film on them; in which, the doors need to be cleaned. The brown film could harbor bacteria or disease that could affect the health of 20 animals.

Direct. Sec. 3.3 Sheltered housing facilities. (a) Heating, cooling, and temperature. The sheltered part of sheltered housing facilities for dogs and cats must be sufficiently heated and cooled when necessary to protect the dogs and cats from temperature or humidity extremes and to provide for their health and well-being. The ambient temperature in the sheltered part of the facility must not fall below 50 deg. F (10 deg. C) for dogs and cats not acclimated to lower temperatures, for those breeds that cannot tolerate lower temperatures without stress and discomfort (such as short-haired breeds), and for sick, aged, young, or infirm dogs or cats, except as approved by the attending veterinarian. Dry bedding, solid resting boards, or other methods of conserving body heat must be provided when temperatures are below 50 deg. F (10 deg. C). The ambient temperature must not fall below 45 deg. F (7.2 deg. C) for more than 4 consecutive hours when dogs or cats are present, and must not rise above 85 deg. F (29.5 deg. C) for more than 4 consecutive hours when dogs or cats are present. The preceding requirements are in addition to, not in place of, all other requirements pertaining to climatic conditions in parts 2 and 3 of this chapter.

1. At 2:30 PM the outside temperature is 95 degrees and the ambient temperature inside the in door building on grandpa's place is 90 degrees inside. There is no air-conditioning and air-conditioning is needed, so to maintain an ambient temperature below 85 degrees. The hot temperature can affect the well-being and health for 25 animals.

2. The medium barn has an ambient temperature of 89.6degrees and the ambient temperature outside is 95 degrees at 2:50 PM. There is no air-conditioning and air-conditioning is needed. The hot temperature can affect the health and well-being for 40 animals.

OUTDOOR HOUSING FACILITIES.

Direct Sec. 3.4 Outdoor housing facilities. (b) Shelter from the elements. Outdoor facilities for dogs or cats must include one or more shelter structures that are accessible to each animal in each outdoor facility, and that are large enough to allow each animal in the shelter structure to sit, stand, and lie in a normal manner, and to turn about freely. In addition to the shelter structures, one or more separate outside areas of shade must be provided, large enough to contain all the animals at one time and protect them from the direct rays of the sun. Shelters in outdoor facilities for dogs or cats must contain a roof, four sides, and a floor, and must: (2) Provide the dogs and cats with protection from the direct rays of the sun and the direct effect of wind, rain, or snow;

1. Three outdoor runs do not provide enough shaded area for the large dogs. During the inspection their was no trees or a surface to provide shade. Also, the IR temperature of what shaded area there is was 104 degrees. The non-shaded was 115 degrees. Additional shade cover is needed to provide shade; which can affect the health and well-being of 6 animals.

PRIMARY ENCLOSURES.

Direct Sec. 3.6 Primary enclosures. (a) General requirements. (2) Primary enclosures must be constructed and maintained so that they: (x) Have floors that are constructed in a manner that protects the dogs' and cats' feet and legs from injury, and that, if of mesh or slatted construction, do not allow the dogs' and cats' feet to pass through any openings in the floor;

1. The first little of pups to the left, from the door, feet pass through the plastic flooring. This can affect the range of motion for 7 pups. Smaller holed flooring is needed, so the animal's feet do not pass through.

CLEANING, SANITIZATION, HOUSEKEEPING, AND PEST CONTROL.

Sec. 3.11 Cleaning, sanitization, housekeeping, and pest control. (a) Cleaning of primary enclosures. Excreta and food waste must be removed from primary enclosures daily, and from under primary enclosures as often as necessary to prevent an excessive accumulation of feces and food waste, to prevent soiling of the dogs or cats contained in the primary enclosures, and to reduce disease hazards, insects, pests and odors. When steam or water is used to clean the primary enclosure, whether by hosing, flushing, or other methods, dogs and cats must be removed, unless the enclosure is large enough to ensure the animals would not be harmed, wetted, or distressed in the process. Standing water must be removed from the primary enclosure and animals in other primary enclosures must be protected from being contaminated with water and other wastes during the cleaning. The pans under primary enclosures with grill-type floors and the ground areas under raised runs with mesh or slatted floors must be cleaned as often as necessary to prevent accumulation of feces and food waste and to reduce disease hazards pests, insects and odors.

1. The underneath area, of the runs, on grandpa's farm, is in need of cleaning. The fecal matter and dog hair is white to brown in color. The fecal matter and dog hair could affect the health of 25 animals.

Sec. 3.11 Cleaning, sanitization, housekeeping, and pest control. (c) Housekeeping for premises. Premises where housing facilities are located, including buildings and surrounding grounds, must be kept clean and in good repair to protect the animals from injury, to facilitate the husbandry practices required in this subpart, and to reduce or eliminate breeding and living areas for rodents and other pests and vermin. Premises must be kept free of accumulations of trash, junk, waste products, and discarded matter. Weeds, grasses, and bushes must be controlled so as to facilitate cleaning of the premises and pest control, and to protect the health and well-being of the animals.

1. The fans and air conditioner in the medium and small building have excessive dust and dog hair in them. The dust and dog hair is in need of cleaning, for it can harbor bacteria and disease. The bacteria can affect the health of 60 animals.

Sec. 3.11 Cleaning, sanitization, housekeeping, and pest control. (d) Pest control. An effective program for the control of insects, external parasites affecting dogs and cats, and birds and mammals that are pests, must be established and maintained so as to promote the health and well-being of the animals and reduce contamination by pests in animal areas.

1. During the inspection excessive flies were around the outdoor runs and on the animals. Fly prevention is needed, for the flies can affect the health and well-being of 10 animals.
